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Treasure Hunt in a Bottle Craft


Gather the following items for each child

- 1. Bottle- Find bottles that resemble bottles that you would find floating in the ocean with notes inside. I usually have to settle for plastic water bottles with lids however, I have been fortunate enough to find large plastic BBQ sauce bottles in the past that look extra nice.
- 2. String hemp looks best
- 3. Bird Seed
- 4. 20 trinket items for each bottle- buttons, screws, pennies etc. use your imagination
- 5. Netting; to be placed over the top of the bottle. Fish netting works great but you can look around for any fabric that has a netting effect.
- 6. Treasure hunt in a Bottle Poem
- 7. hole reinforcements
- 8. Scissors
- 9. Hole Punch

In Class: Allow the children to:

- 1. Fill their bottles with bird seed- about half full
- 2. Drop the 20 trinkets inside
- 3. Put the lid on top and shake the bottle
- 4. Re-open the bottle and finish filling the bottle with bird seed. Leave a 3" gap, depending on your particular type of bottle, between the bird seed and the top of the bottle. Experiment prior to class on the space that you need to leave. Child will have to be able to shake the seed around enough to find their items.
- 5. Screw on lid
- 6. Place a piece of netting over the top of the bottle and tie at the neck with a piece of hemp.
- 7. Punch a hole in the corner of the poem
- 8. Reinforce hole with a hole reinforcement
- 9. Run end of string through the hole on the poem and tie onto the bottle with a bow.





Games

Seaweed Tangle

Gather the children in groups of 6-8 players.

Have the children stand in a circle.

Each Person reaches across the circle and takes the right hand of the person standing across from them. Then take the left hand of a different person.

Without letting go of hands, groups try to untangle themselves.

Water Toss

Fill (3/4 full) re-sealable sandwich bags with water. Children form pairs and take turns tossing bag back and forth to one another.

Each child takes one large step backwards after they toss the bag.

Ring Toss

Gather:

Several CD/DVD spindles- (The kind that holds 50-100 CD/DVD's.

1 Small Dive Ring

Place the spindles on the floor and take turn tossing the dive rings.

Object- To ring a spindle with the dive ring
